

EAST AFRICA SCHOOL ON INTERNET GOVERNANCE 2023 REPORT

The 2nd East African School of Internet Governance was held in Kigali, Rwanda on September 04, 2023. The school aimed at building and strengthening the knowledge and capacity of these institutions to better understand internet governance and policy issues in the region.

Further, the school focused on cybersecurity concerns in the IG ecosystem with the aim of strengthening the role of these actors in adopting strong cyber security systems and policy at both national and regional level. The topic was identified during last year's EAIGF meeting in Arusha where cyber security came out strongly as one of the key issues that need to be addressed both at national, regional and continental level.

Participating institutions thus purposely selected representatives directly interface with the topic in their day-to-day job roles.
